

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

The Show Was Live, and So Was the Ammo



I am no big shot. I write, I tell stories for hire, I do little one-man shows in regional theaters, and sometimes I sing, but never dance (this is a failure of neurology at the cellular level, as even the beloved polka escapes me, and yes, I'm aware it's just one, two, three.). I also sell t-shirts. (We discontinued the coffee mugs as too many were breaking in transit.) This is what your bigshot corporate types refer to as "diversification" and barring tenure or a blockbuster, it is the key to survival. The upshot of this itinerant cobble of self-employment is that I am on the road somewhere around 80 to 100 days per year. I fancy the phrase "on the road," as it conjures tumbleweed horizons, figurative artistic martyrdom, and muraled tour buses dieseling through the night. In fact, it's generally just me in the family wagon with a box of books and a late check-in at the nearest Super 8 after totally rocking the public library.

The gratitude I feel to everyone I meet out there (or who has ever read one of my books, or listened to one of my songs, or arranged a concert or signing, or set up chairs, or put up posters, or sent me on my way with homemade snickerdoodles, or, or, or...) is frankly inexpressible. You are a fascinating, heartening bunch. Some of you are National Public Radio, some of you are Moose Country 106.7. Some of you are cap-and-gown, some of you are barn-boots-and-chore-coat. Some of you are gas, some of you are diesel, and an appreciable segment of you are righteously hybrid. You are town, you are country, you are suburban with chickens. When I shake your hands at the signing table your grips run the gamut from dishwater soft to bricklayer-thick. There is here and there overlap, and I like that especially. In short, you are not easily penned and sorted.

The photo above features three of the four most recent gifts given to me by readers at a book signing. Atop the books

there, that's a carburetor for a 1951 International Harvester. Upper left you can see a vintage plumb bob with its own canvas case (the story behind the plumb bob is in the book *Coop*). Not pictured is a handcrafted International Harvesterlogo made of stained glass (it's hung in my office window). And that box on the upper right contains 20 live rounds of ammo for my deer rifle. Each presented with a smile, a handshake, and a book opened for signing. I leave it for you to judge what these gifts say about me, my material, and my audience, but I take it as the heartiest sort of good news.
